Emergency Preparedness for Your Farm

The last few years have been quite a reminder that you never know what's going to happen, or when. Garnered from a variety of resources online (listed at the end of this article), the following information may be helpful for your farm.

An Emergency Action Plan (EAP) outlines an organized response to problems that could occur on your farm and can dramatically improve the outcome of a disaster. By planning ahead, you and your team can work together towards fewer injuries and less destruction of property during and after an emergency situation.

The first part of making an Emergency Action Plan is to gather information: What disasters or hazards are most likely in your community? For your farm? How would you be warned? How should you prepare for each?

Next, learn the warning systems for your community. Can you see or hear local sirens or emergency lights from your farm? Emergency broadcasts might come in the form of the radio/televised Emergency Alert System, NOAA weather alerts or other news sources on radio, television, internet. Apps on our smart phones can help with this!

It will help to walk around your property. You've probably already taken steps to avoid accidents and mitigate the effects of some disasters. Learn from past situations. How were previous problems dealt with; were you able to communicate quickly and effectively? Did first responders have enough information and site-specific data to respond appropriately? After an event, write down what you would have done differently.

Included in your plan should be:

- Ω Responses to different types of emergency
- Ω Emergency escape procedures and routes, as well as floor plans and workplace maps, and a map marking higher elevations on the property.
- Ω Electrical shut-off locations; water and gas line shut-off valve locations
- Ω How to report emergencies (ie: phone tree, text messages, farm bell or alarm...)
- Ω Chain of command, with areas of responsibility and contact information
- Ω Emergency contact information for each person's next of kin
- Ω Procedures to account for family and workers.
- Ω Emergency supply lists and locations.
- Ω Contact information for your insurance agents, suppliers of goods & services (feed, fuel, etc)
- Ω An inventory of your assets. Include livestock & buildings, as well as machinery/equipment/technology makes model, and serial numbers.

Be sure to practice your emergency plan. Not only will this help in an emergent situation, it will also help point out areas in the plan that need adjustment.

Your EAP should cover preparedness (what to do prior to an emergency, ie: supplies needed on hand; locations and staff for transporting animals and property); immediate action necessary during an emergency, and a post-emergency checklist.


Be sure to update your EAP after staff or location changes, acquisition or loss of animals, land or equipment.
